During lunch, students sit three to a table and disposable utensils are used. There are new windows with short openings at the bottom in front of the office for quick and easy contact with our school secretaries. With those being the huge changes made at this point in time, it's unsure if more changes will be made or tweaked as time goes on.

For now, these adjustments are the new normal. As unfortunate as it is that these policies have to take place, it's better than everyone having to attend school completely online.

Did you feel you were isolated from the rest of the class?

Cass: My classmates and teachers did a really good job of making me feel like I was a part of the class and helping me with assignments when I needed it.

Was the transition back to in-person difficult?

Olivia: Yes, the transition was difficult. I felt like I was playing catch-up with everyone else. Like, they all knew what was going on and I had to ask for help every five minutes. After about a week, I got it pretty good, though.

Is the school day structured the same?

It's a little bit different. We enter at the same time, at 8:00, but then we leave at 2:30 because we don't have advisory or any advisory class. We also don't have lunch time. We have a break that you can take. It's half an hour and you can bring snacks to eat but we usually eat lunch at 2:30. Here, lunch is way earlier than in Spain. So when the lunch bell rings, we go eat lunch at home.

What was the trip here like?

I had to take three planes. The first one was from Madrid to Amsterdam. My father went with me to Amsterdam because I didn't have anyone to bring me there. And then to go from Amsterdam to the United States, we had to sign a lot of papers and and me, by myself, couldn't do that. Then, in Amsterdam, I was supposed to be alone for the rest of the flight, but because of the Corona Virus, I can't fly by myself. It's obligatory to have a minor assistant that goes with you, so I had to pay to have him fly with me.


An overview of fall sports at Hurley
